Events

Captivate

On September 14, the CSU kicked off the academic year with one of Capilano University's biggest events ever — Captivate. The event featured a professional sound and stage setup, local DJs, beer garden, prizes and giveaways, and food trucks from around the Lower Mainland. Attendance goals were met and surpassed, making it one of the most highly attended events in Capilano University history.

Clubs and Collectives Day

Clubs and Collectives Day sought to connect students with involvement opportunities on campus. 15 CSU clubs and collectives set up in the CSU Members Centre to advertise involvement opportunities and attract new members. There were hundreds of new sign-ups, with the newly formed Yoga Club getting 60 new sign-ups alone.

Self-defense training

On April 6 and 11, the CSU brought Women Educating in Self-Defense Training on campus to facilitate two intro-

ductory self-defense classes on campus. The event was a success and there is discussion surrounding making it a regular event.

Tenants' rights event

In September, as a part of our #adulting events series, the CSU invited the Tenant Resource and Advisory Centre on campus to answer questions about the rights of renters all across the Lower Mainland. Attendees were given information about common misconceptions and how to pursue action against bad landlords.

Recreation events

With the introduction of the CSU's new fee for recreation and intramurals, the CSU has expanded its event planning capacity to expand recreation-focused events. A hike around Rice Lake served as the inaugural event, with skating excursions currently planned for students taking classes at both the Sunshine Coast and North Vancouver campuses later in the fall semester. The CSU looks forward to growing its recreation program over the year.

Advocacy

Government relations

As part of its mandate to advocate on behalf of students, the CSU has maintained relations with lawmakers in order to influence policy development on the local, provincial, and federal level.

External partnerships

The CSU is a member of two external lobbying groups that lobby different levels of government — the Alliance of BC Students (ABCS) and the Canadian Alliance of Students Associations (CASA).

The ABCS lobbies government on the provincial level. The CSU is among the most active member associations of the ABCS, with our vice-president also serving on the ABCS board of directors. The CSU participated in ABCS Lobby Days, which enables representatives to meet with lawmakers in Victoria. The CSU officially joined CASA this year, which represents a great opportunity for Capilano University students to have their voices heard at the federal level.

BC legislative budget committee participation

CSU representatives made a presentation to the Province of British Columbia's standing select committee on finance and government services in order to advocate for mental health funding for campuses, student housing, needs based grants and the continuation of the U-Pass BC program.


